This year's "Harvest resources for churches" focus on Burkina Faso – where our sponsored child, Mariam, lives.



Rosine and Abdoul may only be in class six, but they're already honing their skills in the vegetable garden. Over the past year, they've been busy learning how to care for delicate seedlings, grow healthy plants, and harvest nutritious produce. It's vital knowledge that will serve them well throughout their lives.

Life here in Burkina Faso – one of the hottest and driest countries in the world – can be tough. And, as climate change brings longer droughts and more unpredictable rainfall, it's getting harder and harder for people to find clean water, or grow the food they need to survive.

But, thanks to a new solar-powered water system, Rosine and Abdoul's school now has a flourishing vegetable garden – giving children here the opportunity to learn important skills, as well as providing nutritious meals in the canteen. And it's not just the pupils who benefit: there's a tap stand for local residents too, who can also buy extra vegetables for their own cooking.

A Letter from Arthur

I can't think how many letters I have written for the Oracle, but this is the most difficult one of all to write - so here goes.

"FOR I'M BUILDING A PEOPLE OF POWER"



In 1968 the Rowe family arrived in Leicester. Early on, after one of my services, Betty Oldershaw came up to Ann and said, "I don't know what your husband has got, but AMEN!" We just clicked with our new congregation. I think you knew that Ann and I would give you 100% and you gave us 100% in return. When I look back and think of what we the 1970s. Two accomplished in churches coming together and a major building programme with all depts paid off by the numerous fund-raising efforts.

Working together helped to bond the two congregations together. We cut down the costs by doing the decorating ourselves: families working on August Bank Holiday Monday to finish the job, under the watchful eye of Alan, our architect.

The Men's Club came out of our working together, there was more youth work, and we had wonderful music.

The church renewed, in a revolutionary way.

We pioneered much of what is taken for granted today. The Preschool Playgroup was one of the first in the area. We held a Luncheon Club for the elderly every Saturday, the church was open for coffee every Tuesday and Thursday morning, and we held Petticoat Lane at the side of the Church.

I humbly believe the good Lord knew what He was doing when he sent us to South Wigston.

When we left it was with heavy hearts, but the Lord had other plans for us.

In 1995 we returned to Leicester, but only the 2 of us. We found a very different church.

In the 70s it was on the full, now it was on the ebb, circumstances had taken their toll, so many ministers who were only here for a short time, young people moving away, and a congregation growing older.

Then came the pandemic, the country was suffering, churches were suffering and so was our congregation.

There was a lot of grief for loved ones sorely missed.

A new kind of ministry evolved for our church. We are a close community and offer one another comfort, support and love. Who is to say this ministry is not as important as in the "glory days?" I know how much I personally have valued the love you have shown to me in my own difficult days.

Very shortly I shall be moving some 200 miles away. BUT, you will always be my family, I love you all and it has been a privilege to serve you.

Our prayers and best wishes go to Arthur and his son Martin as they move into their new house – sometime in the near future. We trust that all will go well and that Arthur will find a welcoming church and make new friends.

The Good Shepherd

I have just finished re-reading "Far From The Madding Crowd" by Thomas Hardy.

It is the story of Gabriel Oak, a young shepherd, who is in love with the beautiful, fiercely independent Bathsheba Everdene. He proposes to her, but she turns him down.

Their fortunes take very different paths, Bathsheba inherits her Uncles's farm, but Gabriel loses everything when his young rogue dog drives his entire flock of sheep over a cliff to their death.

Now ruined, Gabriel goes to a hiring fair, but no one wants a shepherd. He is on his way to another fair when he sees some hay ricks on fire, he goes to see if he can help and finds the farmhands rushing around in chaos. He manages to organize the workers and the fire is brought under control.

Unbeknown to Gabriel the farm belongs to Bathsheba, who employs him as a shepherd. He helps her out in many difficult circumstances, and she comes to rely on him.

He is always there to support her, even after her disastrous marriage to the dashing Sargeant Troy, a cavalry man in the local militia, an improvident gambler with no interest in farming.

A neighbouring farmer, who is also in love with Bathsheba, sees the callous way Troy treats her and in a jealous rage shoots him dead.

Gabriel decides that there is nothing left for him to stay for and plans to leave to start a new life in Canada.

All ends happily as Bathsheba realizes that she is in love with Gabriel and cannot cope without him, her Good and Faithful Shepherd.

Just as in our lives, Jesus is our Good Shepherd and we cannot cope without him.

Riz Gras – a WaterAid recipe from Burkina Faso where this one-pot meal is one of the most popular dishes.

120ml vegetable oil 2 onions, chopped

5 cloves garlic, minced 2 chillies, finely chopped (or to taste)

3 tomatoes, seeded & chopped

170g tomato puree 400g long grain rice

800ml chicken stock (or veg stock) Cinnamon stick

- Heat the oil in a large pan, and add the onion. Cook until translucent – around 5 minutes.
- Add the garlic, chillies and tomatoes. Cook for another 3 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- Add the tomato puree and rice, and stir. Now add the stock, cinnamon stick, and salt & pepper to taste.
- Reduce the heat to low, and cover. Cook for about 12 minutes, stirring occasionally, until the rice is cooked and the liquid is absorbed. Check to make sure most of the liquid is absorbed.
- Turn off the heat, stir the rice, allow to sit for 10 more minutes to absorb the remaining liquid.
- Meat can be added if available.

News from MHA Aigburth, Manor Road, Oadby

In July the gardens formed part of Oadby & Wigston's *East Midlands in Bloom* tour of the borough. A fortnight later the Borough, and Aigburth garden, was inspected as part of the East Midlands entry to Britain in Bloom. The results will be released in September and October. The weather was fine and sunny on both days so the judges were able to see residents enjoying the gardens.

The home was reviewed by the Care Quality Commission in July and was rated GOOD in all areas.

Thanks to fundraising events and grants residents have enjoyed 2 canal boat trips run by the Peter le Marchant Trust in Loughborough, with a further trip in September. The minibus is being used to take residents to the allotments on Welford Road. Aigburth staff member, Mike, shows them his allotment and what he is growing and they share refreshments in the fresh air. In the home soloists and groups of musicians regularly perform pieces in a variety of styles from classical to folk and jazz. A resident's granddaughter even brought along her harp.
