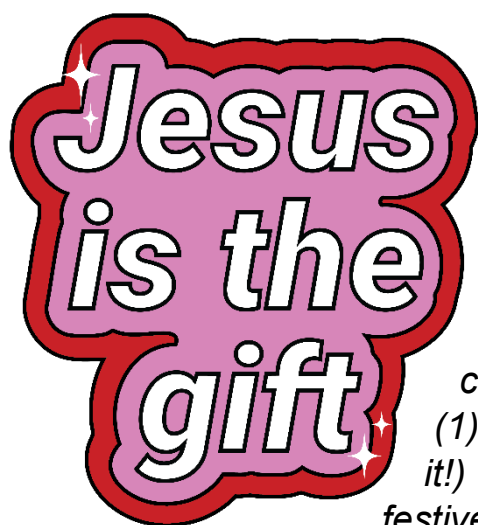

## *A message from Rev'd Ian Hu*

*A voice cries out:*

*"In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord,  
make straight in the desert a highway for our God."*

*-Isaiah 40:3*

Dear South Wigston Methodist Church Friends,

Welcome to the season of Advent, which consists of four weeks including four Sundays. The term Advent is derived from the Latin *adventus*, which means 'coming.' This season proclaims the comings of Jesus Christ... whose birth we prepare to celebrate once again, who comes continually in Word and Spirit, and in whose return in final victory we anticipate. Every year, the season of Advent calls us to prepare for these comings: historically, the season was marked by fasts for preparation.

In general, each Sunday of Advent has a distinctive theme, which can typically be seen as Christ's coming in final victory (first Sunday in Advent); John the Baptist (second and third Sundays in Advent), and the events immediately prior to the birth of Jesus Christ (Fourth Sunday in Advent). These observations are intended to prepare each of us for the celebration of Christ's birth on Christmas Day.

This season is observed through emphasis of the colours purple and/or blue for paraments, stoles and banners. Visual images throughout this season can include an Advent wreath, which will typically encompass an evergreen wreath with four purple candles or three purple candles plus one rose coloured candle, with a central white Christ candle added on Christmas Eve/Christmas Day. In addition, a Chrismon tree, which is an evergreen tree covered with white monograms of Christ, and a Jesse tree, a tree with signs of the ancestors of Christ, can be used. Other symbols of the season typically include trumpets for Isaiah, a messianic rose, a star of Jacob and a fleur-de-lis.



Here at South Wigston Methodist Church, I am looking forward to experiencing my very first 'Christmas Capers' on Saturday 6 December 2025, along with the light switch scheduled for 5 pm. Many people throughout our church and the community have filled me in on this tradition and I'm looking forward to experiencing it! I am also looking forward to leading worship at South Wigston on Christmas Day at 10 am (please note the change of time!)

*On Christmas Morning, you are invited to join our celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ by bringing one (1) unopened gift (please be sure that your name is on it!) to worship, and you are encouraged to don your festive Christmas jumpers and bright colours!*

May we continue to experience the seasons of the Christian year in our worship, our service and our daily lives as the family of Christ. And thank you all for being the Church!

## Stand with Refugees

At a time when we are witnessing increasing anti-migrant sentiment in some local communities and in politics, it is more important than ever to show that not only are refugees welcome here, but that our communities stand wholeheartedly together.

The 'Communities Together with Refugees' campaign is a cross-community moment which aims to demonstrate unignorable public support for refugees and people seeking asylum. Coordinated by the Together with Refugees coalition, in which the **JPIT denominations** are founding members, it will show that our communities stand together with refugees and against those who would seek to sow division and hate.



Focused on the first weekend of December (5-7 December 2025), the idea is to have public displays of orange hearts – a symbol of compassion for people fleeing war and persecution – in thousands of different ways, from posters in community spaces, to giant Christmas decorations on town centre trees or orange heart-shaped biscuits given out at community events. All these gestures of care and solidarity will show that we stand together and in community with refugees.

**The Joint Public Issues Team (JPIT)** is a partnership between the Baptist Union of Great Britain, the Methodist Church and the United Reformed Church. The purpose of JPIT is to help the Churches to work together for peace and justice through listening, learning, praying, speaking and acting on public policy issues.

November 2025

The results of our National Churches Survey are in. We surveyed thousands of churches, chapels and meeting houses across nations and denominations, from medieval churches and Nonconformist chapels to Catholic parishes and vibrant Pentecostal spaces. We asked about everything from community activities, services and volunteers to repairs, facilities and hopes for the future, and the results are enlightening.

We launched the survey results at the recent Great Expectations event at the Victoria & Albert Museum in London, where voices from across the church and heritage sector came together to explore the future of the UK's churches, chapels and meeting houses, informed by the new insights we've uncovered.

**What we've learned is that churches are more vulnerable than ever, but they are still playing a vital role at the heart of local communities.** One in ten churches need urgent repairs to their roofs and guttering in the next 12 months, and only two-thirds believe their church will 'definitely' be open in five years' time. But over half are involved with distributing food to the community, and 82% now have fully accessible entrances, up from 63% in 2010. While the survey results highlight the challenges facing churches, they also make visible the incredible work churches are doing and the potential for renewal. We will continue doing all we can to help keep churches open and in use, and we are very grateful for your ongoing support.

## Mary's New Year memories

My English/Welsh family didn't celebrate New Year – Christmas was much more important – so when I met my future husband and his Scottish family it was a real culture shock.

His parents had a tall Victorian house in High Wycombe and together with two of his sisters we cleaned the house from top to bottom – it was said that the state of your house at New Year would be reflected for the rest of the year.

Food was laid out, including “oor” Margaret's famous steak pie, and black bun. The radio was turned on ready for The Bells at midnight when glasses were raised and *Auld Lang Syne* was sung. There was much hugging and kissing. Someone would arrive to First Foot with symbols such as coal, bread and a dram. It might have been one of the dark-haired men who was sent outside before midnight.

Neighbours were all invited and teenagers who had been out with their friends would turn up. Babies and young children were snuggled in the big beds.

After the food came the singing – everyone had to perform their party piece – an ordeal for this shy teenager. My husband always sang *The Wild Rover*.

By about 4am I was happy to disappear to the kitchen to do the washing up. We didn't get much sleep. By 9 am my mother-in-law was queen of the kitchen dishing up a wonderful breakfast with black pudding and square (Lorne) sausage as the bleary-eyed members of the family surfaced.
